A MESSAGE FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, ANDY JOHNSON:

Dear Families and Staff of Sage International Schools,

Tomorrow is <u>Holocaust Remembrance Day</u>, the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz - one of the most widely recognized symbols of the Nazi planned and led Holocaust of Jewish people and other vulnerable groups such as LGBTQ people, Sinti, Roma, priests, ministers, people with disabling conditions, and people considered to be enemies of the State (the Nazi Party). I ask each of you to take a moment to remember all of the victims of the Holocaust. Antisemitism is alive and well in Boise, the United States and around the world. Similarly, hate crimes and violence inspired by hate towards vulnerable groups continues.



Schoolwide Teacher Training: A Glimpse into our Friday Work

Among other professional development opportunities, teachers in grades K-10 will team together this spring to complete a book study on *Building Thinking Classrooms in Mathematics* (Liljedahl). As the title suggests, this text focuses on practical and specific ways we can increase critical thinking and engagement in mathematics. Each book study session will be led by a teacher-team whose members will act as facilitators and collaborators for the staff as a whole.



A MESSAGE FROM DANNY SOLOMON, DEAN OF STUDENTS AND CAMPUS OPERATIONS



It's cold! You may have noticed that we have moved students inside several mornings during drop-off the last few weeks.

If you're curious about how we decide when kids are inside vs. outside, here is our typical practice:

- Inside if it is below 20 degrees Fahrenheit
- Inside if the air quality is in the unhealthy range (more info here)
- Inside if the precipitation is such that students will be wet, no matter how well they dressed for the weather
- Inside if there is something occurring in the community that we want to avoid exposing students to (typically related to safety, such as a stray animal, etc.)

We can always use your help in having students dressed to thrive in the day's weather, knowing they are outside for up to half an hour at a time (longer for PE, conditions allowing). It also helps speed up the pick-up and drop-off process if students are prepared to jump out of or into the car upon your arrival.

We have also had a few concerned citizens share worries over unsafe driving on Parkcenter. Please continue to follow all traffic laws to keep ourselves and our community safe. I always appreciate how well the Sage community represents itself. Let's turn the least-fun, rush-hour traffic into an opportunity to elevate our community.

Hello Sage Families,

I hope the year is going well for you so far. We've been enjoying the start to our second semester and are proud of our kids for working hard on their MAP testing. We are proud of them!

Whether it's the winter blues setting in or the start of the new year, I have been hearing a bit more 'worries' from kids lately. Worries that quickly turn into anxiety or fear. Because of this, I wanted to share a tip with families so that you can support kiddos at home when they are feeling worried or nervous about something - try turning their worry into wonder.

Often, when a child expresses fear or worry, our initial reaction is to say: "There's nothing to worry about." But, even adults know that facing something new or doing something hard — even when it's a good thing — can be stressful. Plus, saying this can make kids think that they shouldn't feel the way that they do, which can be harmful to your child and your relationship.

Instead, listen and show them that you understand and accept their worries. Second, help them rephrase their worries and turn them into wonder. Here is a <u>helpful graphic</u> with some tips!

By the way, this is not just helpful for kids - I use it on myself and find it to be very helpful! Enjoy the rest of your January!

Both our Middle School and High School programs are hosting FUN dances tonight that we hope your student will attend!



THE PYP WITH KATE HUNTER

Report Cards, State Standards, IB - how it all fits together

Many IB Schools worldwide, including Sage, use the IB PYP as their foundational structure while weaving in required local or



It is with this in mind that we design our curriculum around the PYP's transdisciplinary themes (i.e., the <u>Programme of Inquiry</u>) and fit the key Idaho Content Standards within those themes by grade level.

On your child's report card, then, you will see scores on a proficiency scale of 1 to 4, focusing on the key topics of the Idaho Content Standards (ex, Reading Comprehension or Operations and Algebraic Thinking). Of course, these key topics house unique standards at each grade level that develop in complexity. You will also see scores on the report card in the areas of Approaches to Learning, which are IB-identified traits that are important for all of us to develop (ex, Communication Skills). We report primarily on Idaho State Standards because ultimately we are a public

Classroom Spotlight, 2nd Grade

To see how state standards can integrate into the larger IB Programme of Inquiry, consider the current 2nd-grade PYP inquiry unit "How We Express Ourselves". Students are studying various forms of human communication and expression, taking a field trip to visit the <u>James Castle House</u> here locally, and weaving in Idaho Content Standards that ask them to conduct short research tasks (an English Language Arts Content







Standard) and compare defining attributes of two- and three-dimensional shapes (a Math Content Standard, and an excellent one for analyzing the work of James Castle!).


