## **PYP: Classroom Spotlight: 2nd Grade**

As part of their PYP Inquiry Unit "How We Organize Ourselves", 2nd grade students and teachers have immersed themselves in creating and operating a mini business, selling flowers to benefit local non-profit organizations. Students have learned how to problem-solve and collaborate in this process, and they have also had a chance to engage

Morning Drop Off, Grades 2-5: We are making a slight change to where students will wait outside for school to start in the morning. This will have no impact on how or where you drop students off. Please drop your students off near the sidewalk in front of Everest, as you have been doing. From there, students will travel to the playground where they can wait and play with friends. This creates a safer place for students to wait because they are protected by fencing and moved away from traffic. It has the added bonus of being a much more fun location to begin the day. The Middle School is holding our 2nd Annual Career Day on Thursday, January 18th. A large number of volunteers is required specifically for our 8th graders who will be participating in Reality Town, a simulation that teaches students to manage finances while also recognizing education as a means to more financial stability. The current Sources of Strength (SoS) campaign is centered around Gratitude. Research shows when we share our gratitude with others we feel stronger and happier. First, students wrote on a link of paper what they were grateful for. The chain itself turned out to be over 150 long. ## HIGH SCHOOL WITH BRANDY BURKETT

Greetings Sage Families,

It has been a busy fall here in the high school. We have had several studentled and teacher-led events and experiences. One of our academic goals in the Diploma Programme is to better prepare our students to write an

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excellent Extended Essay. The Extended Essay is a core requirement of the Diploma Programme that factors into students' overall score as they test for the IB Diploma. This paper is an independent, self-directed piece of research, and this year Austin Weeks (DP teacher) and Danielle Konkol (Media Specialist) have partnered to build a more comprehensive support system for our Year 1 students as they write their EE. Each week, DP students take part in focused sessions with Mr. Weeks and Ms. Konkol in our library. On Friday, October 27th, DP students were invited to Boise State to participate in a guided research workshop where they accessed scholarly articles through BSU's library. Students had such a great experience and we will definitely be utilizing this resource again!

In the Career-related Programme, Year 1 students are focusing their learning on the Design Thinking Model as they work to develop a product or service to solve a problem of their choice. All of this work is to prepare students to attend the <u>Youth Idaho Entrepreneurial Challenge</u> which is hosted by Venture College. This year we hope to send 2-3 teams to compete. In years past, Sage students have earned multiple top-place finishes and this has resulted in cash prizes for our students. More to come on this as these develop!

Sage Fall Festival & Boo at the Zoo CAS (Creativity, Activity, Service) Volunteer Day: On October 31st all 11/12th-grade students assisted in throwing our annual Fall Festival for PYP students. In this student-led event, PYP students visit the Summit building and rotate through several activities. As always, it was a wonderful time! That same weekend several of our DP students volunteered their time with our High School Beta Club at Boo at the Zoo. Both of our IB programmes require service hours as part of their Core and this opportunity was all student-led.
