FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, ANDY JOHNSON

Dear Families and Staff of Sage International Schools,

I hope you are all well and thriving. Thank you for supporting your children's schools so strongly and embracing our schools' mission.

This is especially important as schools that value intercultural understanding - essentially developing the skills and mindsets that help a person bridge divides between their own experiences and identity and others' experiences and identities.

At schools that embrace an International Baccalaureate education, developing intercultural understanding is central to a student's experience. Further, strong intercultural understanding can help people navigate difficult/challenging social, work and educational issues. Central to developing intercultural understanding at Sage schools is the study of, practice with and acquisition of skill speaking a second language. At our Boise campus, students study French from Kindergarten to 12th Grade. At our Middleton campus, they study Spanish over the same span of grades.

French and Spanish are both important global languages and open up travel, work and study opportunities across the western hemisphere, Europe and sub-Saharan Africa - home to some of the fastest growing economies of the world. Additionally, French and Spanish are superb "entry points" to learning multiple languages. There is also evidence that learning a second language can lead to improved outcomes in mathematics, problem solving and flexible thinking.

As we approach the end of the year, I encourage each of you to engage with and to encourage your children to continue to engage with their second language. There is a kaleidoscopic array of language learning podcasts available, Mango (very similar to Rosetta Stone) is available for free through the Boise Public Library and through the internet, thousands of radio, television and news outlets are available 24/7 for additional practice and immersion. Check in with your child's teacher for more recommendations. I am always happy to help as well. Stay engaged with your second language!

On a personal note - I believe in lifelong learning - particularly learning new languages. I started with French in Harrisonville Junior High School, learned German in my undergraduate studies, Dutch at the Defense Language Institute, Czech at graduate school and now I am learning Ukrainian - using podcasts and 1:1 tutoring with a professor in Ukraine. It is incredibly fun. Languages open up whole new worlds.

Finally, for parents of rising 10th -12th Grade students - the <u>National Security Language</u> <u>Initiative - Youth (NSLI-Y)</u> is a State Department supported program that selects and sends students for six week long, in-country immersive language learning programs. It is competitive and incredibly rewarding. My children were lucky to do this. My son went to Tajikistan to learn Tajiki (dialect of Persian-Farsi) and my daughter went to Taiwan for Mandarin Chinese. Again, for families and students who are interested, I am happy to speak with you about this program.

TRAFFIC UPDATE FROM DANNY SOLOMON

Hello, Sage families! The purpose of my update is to tune up our traffic habits as we drop off and pick up K-12 students on campus. While we are limited in how traffic patterns can be adjusted, the vast majority of you dutifully follow our norms and that helps our process be as safe and as efficient as possible. We see you. Thank you.



What slows down traffic for everyone and creates dangerous situations is when individuals create alternate plans with their student for pick up and drop off. For the sake of student safety and in respect for the time of the majority who are following the norms, please attend to the following:

- Do not use our neighboring facilities as a place to drop off or pick up. We do not have permission to do so, and our unauthorized use of their space tarnishes the school's reputation. Additionally, it creates unsafe and unexpected pedestrian foot traffic as students cross areas where walking is not allowed during pick up and drop off.
- Coach students who are walking/biking to campus to use crosswalks. We have students who are using unexpected crossings, and it endangers their safety and slows traffic flow.
- Coach students who are walking/biking to campus to follow expected traffic laws and norms. We do not want students hurt during their commute to or from school.
- Please follow all traffic expectations outlined here. Everyone can think of a reason they need an exception 'just this one time.' We can also believe that we have found a 'hack' that works for us. If we fall prey to that pattern of thinking, soon traffic becomes unsafe and sluggish for everyone, and we strain relationships with our neighbors in the community at large. Part of what we teach our children is the value of community and the importance of their contribution to the community. Please help us model that.

Thank you to everyone for contributing to a process that can be frustrating at times. Your self-discipline and willingness to help Sage as a whole is seen and appreciated.

PYP WITH DIRECTOR KATE HUNTER

I want to share our plan for administering the ISAT (Idaho Standards Achievement Tests) at Sage in grades 3-5. The ISAT is the primary, comprehensive assessment given each spring in all public schools in the state, and it consists of two assessments in Math and two assessments in English Language Arts.



Students in grades 3-5 will take the two ELA/reading assessments on April 16, 17, and 18th. One of these assessments is computer-adaptive (on the 16th), and the other is a performance task, wherein students will have one testing session (on the 17th) to plan their work and one session to complete the task itself (on the 18th). All testing sessions will be completed prior to lunch each day.

The next week, students will take the two Math assessments on April 23rd, 24th, and 25th. We will follow the same format as above for the computer-adaptive and performance task portions.

For me as a school leader and a parent (my own 3rd grade son will take his first ISATs this year), it is important to note what the ISAT is and what it is not. Of course, ISAT results by individual student provide us with an additional data point (among many) to identify strengths and needs. With this in mind, we ask that students approach each assessment well-rested and ready to do their best so that we get the most accurate, actionable results possible.

More importantly, however, ISAT results help us evaluate our work as a school-wide system. They help us drill down, by instructional standards, and identify where we are preparing students well and where we need to adjust our instruction or our practices in some way. I use the word 'we' intentionally -- these are our students, K-12, and our results; we own them collectively. From this lens, ISAT results are most valuable in helping us reflect on our practices as educators.

If your child is stressed about ISATs and their individual performance, please remind them that these assessments are a chance for educators to see what we need to do differently. They are NOT about if a child is a 'good student'; there is so much more to each of us than a given standardized test measure.

Spotlight Special: French

Bonjour Sage Familles! During the month of March, K-5 participates in la Manie Musicale! We join schools from all over the world in a discovery of popular French Musique and we use this opportunity to build our interpersonal speaking skills, expressing our feelings and opinions. Our essential skill here is as follows: I CAN express my opinions about popular French music and agree and disagree with others' opinions. PYP Continued...

This month I co-presented at the Pacific Northwest Regional Conference for Language Teaching in Seattle with K-5 teaching colleagues from Oregon and Washington. I leveraged the work that we are currently doing with the Manie Musicale to illustrate how we develop students' ownership of their learning and build complexity in core skills over time. 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MIDDLE SCHOOL WITH DIRECTOR ZACH PARKER

This year we were able to enhance our Career Day by introducing our 8th graders to an activity called "Reality Town". In this simulation students were offered job opportunities based on their actual current GPA; the higher their GPA the higher the salary and the lower the GPA the lower the salary. They were also assigned a family (or lack of) to support.





Students were able to experience "adulting" by making decisions on how they chose to spend their money. I'd like to have a special thank you to Lana Moss for organizing this event. Please enjoy the interviews from students who participated in this video.

This week students will take part in two annual events. Our Earth Day Celebrations are a segment of Wednesday and Thursday afternoons and provide recreational and educational activities for all students. This year's theme centers around water. Additionally, our 7th graders will be visiting Minidoka in Central Idaho to tour the Japanese Internment Camp that existed during WW2. This camp once housed over 13,000 Japanese Americans. Today it is identified as a National Historic Site.

Middle School continued...

Next, on an academic level, when we return from Spring Break the Middle School will begin our ISAT testing. The first week back we will focus on ELA content/standards and during week two attention will turn to math. Points to note and conversations to share with your student prior to ISATS can include:

- ISAT scores are an important indicator of student growth, however, it is only one data point in the years-long examples of student learning;
- Students will not be able to use their personal tech devices or headsets (airpods, etc). The school will provide all these.

Finally, I'd like to offer a recent article from a source I often share. This is from screenagersmovie.com and their most recent article titled Solving Smart Phone Problems are Teens are Reporting. This article highlights "findings from a Fall of 2023 study [through the Pew Research Center] with important stats that can help inform our parenting and spark essential conversations with our youth." As always, it's worth a read to help you have constructive conversations with your student and their cell phone usage.










High School continued...



SUPPORTING SAGE

Families....we are need your help. Let's look at some important numbers for our annual Mind the Gap Fundraising Campaign:

- We are about 80% of the way through the school year. We have raised only 43% of our Mind the Gap goal. This is much lower than years past.
- We've had 117 generous families donate, or about 15% of our students' families.
- 28 of those donations have been \$500 or greater. (Wow!)
- We have just over 1,000 students at Sage. To meet our goal of \$125k, that's just \$125
 per student. That's about 6 pizzas, or one month of Starbucks' drinks.
- We have until June 30th to raise \$71,000. We can't do it without YOUR help.

On Mondays: Castles, Catapults and Coats of Arms
