FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, ANDY JOHNSON

Dear Families, Students and Staff of Sage International Schools,

I hope that you are all well and are thriving in your lives in and out of school. We are in the days and weeks of the school year when



we are striving to pack as much learning and growth as possible. At the same time, we ask that students do their best to demonstrate what they have learned. Our youngest learners will work hard to demonstrate all that they have learned about the fundamentals of the English language on the Idaho Reading Indicator (IRI), older students will demonstrate language and math skills on the Idaho Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) and the Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) and, for students in 12th Grade - on the International Baccalaureate exams. It can truly seem like a lot of "testing" - and I encourage each of you to view these opportunities as ways to consolidate learning and demonstrate growth.

We - as a school team - pay close attention to what we observe and assess in classrooms and in what these assessments tell us. All of these results help us make decisions about what is working well and what we can improve as a school team. We ask ourselves questions about areas of need, curricular choices, student readiness, gaps in understanding or skills and examine how we might better prepare as a team (on those all-important Friday teacher days). We also believe that students should have agency over their learning. What they learn from reflecting and thinking about their own learning can inform goal-setting and outcome-oriented mindsets - strong predictors of future success and ability to self-regulate.

Over the next few weeks encourage your children to:

- Do their very best every day.
- Eat breakfast and come to school ready to learn.
- Participate in discussions and activities (raise your hand, offer an idea, help a friend).
- Name their intentions (goals) for the day i.e. "I will do my best work on my inclass narrative writing essay."
- Partner with you (their parents) and reflect on how well they met their daily intention (goal).
- · Be active after school
- · Get a good night's sleep every day




Classroom Spotlight: 5th Grade PYPX

Our 5th graders are currently engaged in Exhibition (also known as PYPX), which is the IB's culminating learning experience and celebration that marks the end of the PYP years. The IB notes that Exhibition is a "significant event in the life of the school and the student... that synthesizes essential elements of the PYP". Within Exhibition, students are tasked with "identifying, investigating, and offering solutions to real-life issues or problems". One thing we LOVE about Exhibition is it allows students to delve into an area of authentic interest while focusing on a grade level-wide theme; this approach allows room for both individualized work and common threads of discovery. We also love that students are tasked with taking action, or considering solutions to real world problems. Our central idea this year – co-created between students and teachers – is "Through

small actions, everyone can make an impact", and it falls under our IB transdisciplinary theme of Sharing the Planet. Here our students begin their brainstorming and inquiry into this big (and worthy!) topic.

Specials Spotlight: Performing Arts

This is a busy time of year for Performing Arts class with Ms. T.! Our 2nd graders are learning a dance and rap to support their upcoming inquiry unit on invention & innovation. Our 3rd-5th graders are all gearing up for performances!

MIDDLE SCHOOL WITH DIRECTOR ZACH PARKER

Over the past two weeks the Middle School has been working our way through ISAT testing. By the time you read this we will have wrapped this up. With respect to Middle School-wide testing, this leaves our final MAP testing to be completed the week of May 6-9th. As we tell our students, standardized testing is but one data point in looking at a student's overall academic performance. The overall information we receive and analyze is important for our staff as it helps direct our planning of content and instruction.

Dress Code

Spring is here and we would like to make sure that all students have the opportunity to express themselves while also maintaining a focus on learning by following our school dress code. Our school

dress code is what the Board of Directors has deemed the minimum expectation for attire while at Sage. Please use our friendly Yeti below to help guide your child in their clothing decisions. Our policies, including those related to dress code, can be referenced in our Student-Parent Handbook.

The purpose of the Dress Code and Prohibited Items list is not to infringe on any individual student's rights to freedom of expression, but rather to encourage students to dress for success, be safe, and come to school properly prepared to learn. We ask for your support in promoting a safe and orderly environment in which all students can learn.

Students are not allowed to wear clothing that constitutes a health or safety hazard or is disruptive to the educational process. The dress code applies equally to all genders and identities. Sage Staff is interested in helping students learn and would prefer not to have to speak to students about their clothing. Please help us ensure your child is dressed appropriately.

All forms of dress, including hats/ headwear, accessories, and hair may not constitute a health or safety hazard or disrupt the educational process

Garments are not brief or sheer: private parts are fully covered

Clothing should be appropriate for the weather



Costumes/accessories/ full-face makeup are only permissible when pre- approved by administration

Clothing and accessories do not depict or reference drugs, alcohol, violence/weapons, nudity/sexual references, or hate speech

Footwear must be worn at all times

Dress code may be addressed through small, non-permanent alterations, covering up/adjusting what is not to standard, changing clothing, or being sent home. Repeated violations may be addressed through additional actions.

OUTDOOR EXPEDITIONS

Sage Expeditions had an incredible Spring break taking students on all sorts of incredible adventures. A group of 10 risk-takers set off on a four-day backpacking trip through Hells Canyon. They took a 15mile jet boat ride up the Snake River and hiked themselves out on

the beautiful Snake River Trail. Students learned about Leave No Trace principles and how to protect the spaces they visited while building community and new relationships with peers and faculty!













The remainder of the week we had students in grades 6-10 rock climbing at the Black Cliffs in Southeast Boise with Idaho Mountain Guides.
