FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, ANDY JOHNSON

Dear families and staff of Sage International Schools,



I hope this newsletter finds you all well. We are way into the school year already and I am proud of the work being done by your wonderful children and their fabulous teachers in classrooms at our Boise and Middleton campuses. There are 1,500 children learning and growing in Sage International Schools.

As we enter November and approach Veterans Day, I frequently find myself looking at the United States' flag fluttering in front of each of our campuses. The colors we chose for the flag are intended to remind all Americans of the service and sacrifice that was needed to secure our independence. As a veteran, as the son of a veteran, the brother of a veteran, the husband of a veteran and the father of an active duty Infantry officer it is personally important to me to honor veterans of our armed forces. About .5% of Americans served in Iraq or Afghanistan during nearly 20 years of conflict. In contrast, approximately 9% of Americans served in the armed forces during World War II. Service in our armed forces is borne by an increasingly small share of the population and Veterans Day is an important time to stop and consider that small population's commitment to serve all Americans.

As a family, <u>read about how Veterans Day</u> came to be observed in the United States after World War One. Learn more about World War One at the <u>National World War</u> <u>One Museum and Memorial</u>. On this Veterans Day consider spending time as a family talking to or about veterans in your family. If you don't have veterans in your family you can explore veterans' stories at the <u>National Museum of the United States Army</u>. Locally there are two museums you could visit to understand more about the experience of veterans: <u>The Warhawk Museum</u> in Nampa or the <u>Idaho Military</u> <u>Museum</u> on Gowan Field. Next September 11th, consider participating in Mission 43's <u>9-11 Miles of Remembrance Run</u>.

Finally, I want to thank all of the veterans in our community - parents, grandparents, staff and alumni. Their willingness to serve selflessly is an example for us all to emulate as we continue our work to ensure the next generation of American citizens is equipped to make choices that will mark our country's course over the next 50 years.



'CROSS CAMPUS COLLABORATION

We are excited to highlight some of the wonderful learning experiences possible at our unique K-12 campus in upcoming newsletters, starting with one between 3rd grade and 9-10th grade!

To wrap up the 3rd-grade inquiry under the transdisciplinary theme, *How We Organize Ourselves*, students were asked by the Community Planners of Idaho to plan and design a new city right here in Idaho. After meeting with a city planner at City Hall, students were thrilled to help create a new city. Prior to designing a city, they researched and explored Boise and how it came to be. They became experts on our local community! From there, 3rd-grade students planned and mapped out their ideas to present to the "Community Planners" (Sage high school students).

The 9th/10th grade Computer Science students collaborated to transform 2D city maps into explorable 3D models. They jumped into unfamiliar waters, took a risk, and within two weeks constructed full-sized 3D models of the cities. The 3D models included details down to ducks on ponds, building interiors, and even tooth-shaped dentist buildings. During the group presentations, all students showed truly caring attitudes and communicated clearly. Excellent work and collaboration all around!

The 2024-2025 Empowering Parents Grant applications are open now. Parents of Idaho students ages 5-18 who filed a 2023 Idaho tax return are eligible. Families with adjusted gross incomes (AGI) of under 60k receive priority. Grants are \$1,000 per student and up to \$3,000 per family. The grant funds can be used for a wide range of items to support student learning – including laptops or technology, extracurricular classes, camps, and school athletic fees, driver's education, tutoring or speech therapy – and more!

November Update

Fall is in full swing in the PYP! As we move into November, we will focus on our IB profile trait of **Communicator**, which pairs nicely with our <u>social/emotional tools</u> of Listening and Using our Words. On Friday, November 8th (our one scheduled Friday school day for the

year), we will engage students in some cross-grade level creative and collaborative work (in honor of those key pieces of communication); keep your eyes out for class-specific updates on Toddle.

Literacy Screening

Another key piece of our work in November and early December is ensuring that we are identifying and addressing students' literacy skills in accordance with the Idaho Literacy Achievement and Accountability Act (aka the "Dyslexia Law"). This is a relatively new statute that, in short, requires us to screen all students for characteristics of reading difficulties, including those associated with dyslexia, and develop specific intervention plans for any students showing a need for additional support.

November is a good time of year to conduct this deeper dive, as we have now had a full quarter of experience with students in their new grade level, and we've had a chance to conference with you individually as parents/guardians. While much of this all-school

screening and literacy work has long been in place at Sage, this act is also designed to make school processes more transparent to families (speaking of being good Communicators!) Should your

student show the need for additional literacy support through this screening process, we will be in touch with you individually about what we identified and what our support plan is. Ultimately, we know – and research supports-that children with a wide range of reading difficulties (including dyslexia) can and do learn to read at high levels.







MIDDLE SCHOOL DIRECTOR, ZACH PARKER

The past month was a busy one. Middle School Student Council hosted our fall dance while the student-led Sources of Strength helped promote Positive Friendships by designing a photo booth where friends could gather to take pictures. Additionally, each advisory class is participating in a pumpkin painting contest that 5th graders will judge. The winning class will receive an award and earn points for their grade in the class competition.



As the first quarter wrapped up, we held Parent Teacher Conferences. Looking to always improve, we made a few adjustments this year by adding on an extra hour on Thursday evening and two hours on Friday. The format was still open, allowing parents to seek out any teacher; however, we did make an adjustment where parents signed up for times to meet with Lang and Lit as well as Math teachers. If you were unable to get into either of these two teachers please send them an email. The combined changes reduced the long lines and bottlenecks that have regularly occurred in the past. We were excited to have nearly 150 middle school families attend.

We have a lot planned for November! Next Friday, Nov 8th, we will be holding Career Day. All students will have guest speakers throughout the day. Notably, the 8th grade class will participate in our 2nd Annual Reality Town. Please see the <u>slideshow</u> for a greater, indepth understanding of the event as well as hearing what students who participated last year learned. Also, we are seeking 7 more volunteers to help with Reality Town; no special experience is needed, except for being an adult. I encourage anyone available to email me and come spend a few hours with our awesome 8th graders!!

Just before Thanksgiving Break is our Annual Gratitude Day on Thursday, the 21st. On this special day the entire middle school gives back to the community through service. Among many options, students will rake leaves within our local neighborhood, pick up trash on the greenbelt, and visit Boise State to chalk the sidewalks to encourage and celebrate the young adults who are earning their degree in education and social work. Other students will visit Brookdale Living Center to make cookies with the retired folks, and visit The Ronald McDonald House to help prepare food and clean the living spaces that families use when they stay over waiting on their children's procedures/surgeries to be completed. Once the community engagement ends, we hold a lunch event where all students in the secondary get to eat 'Thanksgiving Leftovers' (turkey sandwiches with all sorts of good sides). This event is run by parent volunteers. I'll be sending out more information in the next couple of weeks and would love to have your support.



OUTDOOR EXPEDITIONS WITH MEGAN FUROIS

October was a busy month for Expeditions on the Boise campus! We ran a 4-week climbing clinic with our awesome partners at Idaho Mountain Guides. We had a group of students grades 6-8 spend Thursday evenings at the Black Cliffs near Lucky Peak learning the basics of outdoor rock climbing and improving their climbing



technique. Climbing is a unique activity that is individualistic but also equires a team of support on the belay. It provides a really incredible opportunity for our students to build trust with each other and inspire confidence in one's self through conquering fear and personal achievement. It was great to see our students build and strengthen relationships through these activities and become more and more confident on the rock. We plan to

provide more rock climbing opportunities in the Spring! Keep your eyes open for emails to come about those.







Outdoor Expeditions continued....

We also took a group of 7th and 8th-grade students to Owyhee county for an overnight camping trip. Students spent a day exploring the Shoofly-Oolite area in BLM land south of Grandview. Here we were able to learn about the geological history of the area and find real artifacts of this history through some very fun fossil hunting. We spent the evening and next morning at Bruneau Dunes State Park where students learned about the stars at the incredible Bruneau Observatory. It was a cloudy evening but we were still able to get a glance of Saturn and the moon through the telescopes at the observatory! This trip was jam packed with adventure and learning opportunities.



Finally, we got nearly 20 4th and 5th-grade students out to Idaho City for a day of learning and exploration. The morning was spent hiking Charcoal Gulch Trail where we learned the 7 principles of Leave No Trace and learned how to identify trees using clues from bark, needles/leaves, and cones. We also got to watch as several planes took off at the nearby airstrip which was SUPER exciting.

The afternoon was filled with a picnic in the park and scavenger hunt around the historic town of Idaho City. Students learned all about the history of the town through the scavenger hunt and practiced navigational skills reading maps to find their clues. LOTS of fun was had!



Our last opportunity for this Fall is on Friday, November 1st for a day of service learning. We've partnered with our friends at the <u>Idaho Trails Association</u> to offer a day of giving back to our outdoor spaces through trail work. Thank you to all our volunteers who've signed up for this opportunity!


ENRICHMENT
