FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, ANDY JOHNSON



Dear families and staff of Sage International Schools,

I hope this newsletter finds you all well. We are way into the school year already and I am proud of the work being done by your

wonderful children and their fabulous teachers in classrooms at our Boise and Middleton campuses. There are 1,500 children learning and growing in Sage International Schools.

As we enter November and approach Veterans Day, I frequently find myself looking at the United States flag fluttering in front of each of our campuses. The colors we chose for the flag are intended to remind all Americans of the service and sacrifice that was needed to secure our independence. As a veteran, as the son of a veteran, the brother of a veteran, the husband of a veteran and the father of an active duty Infantry officer it is personally important to me to honor veterans of our armed forces. About .5% of Americans served in Iraq or Afghanistan during nearly 20 years of conflict. In contrast, approximately 9% of Americans served in the armed forces during World War II. Service in our armed forces is borne by an increasingly small share of the population and Veterans Day is an important time to stop and consider that small population's commitment to serve all Americans.

As a family, <u>read about how Veterans Day</u> came to be observed in the United States after World War One. Learn more about World War One at the <u>National World War One</u> <u>Museum and Memorial</u>. On this Veterans Day consider spending time as a family talking to or about veterans in your family. If you don't have veterans in your family you can explore veterans' stories at the <u>National Museum of the United States Army</u>. Locally there are two museums you could visit to understand more about the experience of veterans: <u>The Warhawk Museum</u> in Nampa or the <u>Idaho Military</u> <u>Museum</u> on Gowan Field. Next September 11th, consider participating in Mission 43's <u>9-11 Miles of Remembrance Run</u>.

Finally, I want to thank all of the veterans in our community - parents, grandparents, staff and alumni. Their willingness to serve selflessly is an example for us all to emulate as we continue our work to ensure the next generation of American citizens is equipped to make choices that will mark our country's course over the next 50 years. FROM HEAD OF SCHOOL, DARCI STELZNER

As we head into the second quarter of the 2024-2025 school year, teachers are steadily increasing the expectation of deep engagement by all students. John Hattie, a New Zealander researcher and educator, composed a meta-analysis on 'what factors in schools have the

greatest impact on student learning'. What he found through 180,000 studies of 200 million students is the greatest impact on student learning is *feedback*. In order of greatest impact, feedback to teachers, teacher clarity, feedback to students, and student-teacher relationships have the greatest effect size.

Sage Middleton is unique in that our four-day student week plus teachers' purposeful professional development on Fridays allow for opportunities to provide these important pieces of feedback and clarity. Teacher-student relationships have always been an incredibly important pillar that we work on daily. We strive for all students to have at least one adult in our school that they feel is their safe person. Walking the halls of our classrooms, it is clear that this is very strong at Sage Middleton!

LIFE IN THE PYP (K-5TH)

As we wrap up another month, the PYP has undergone our monthly Learner Profile celebrations. In the month of October, students were focusing on what it means to be a Thinker. In the IB, to be a thinker is to use critical and creative thinking skills to analyze and take

responsible action on complex problems. We also exercise initiative in making reasoned, ethical decisions. Each class chose three students who exemplified what it means to be a thinker this past month. Congrats to these students for always being an IB learner. Next month, students will focus on what it means to be knowledgeable.

A HUGE thank you to our wonderful PTO for putting on a Trunk-or-Treat event for our community. It was a lovely turnout and students of all ages came to enjoy the event. Thanks to our families and staff who volunteered to host a trunk during the event. To see the smiles on the faces of the

students is what it's all about. We look forward to all the other events planned for the school year.

There are many benefits to our four-day school week, and there is also an opportunity for students to still engage with some at-home practice on the days they are not in school. This could be playing math games, reading stories, playing word games, or computer programs. There are a lot of things that families can do at home to enrich your students' learning beyond the time we have with them at school. We'd be happy to set up activities or provide ideas if you would like, so please let us know if you are interested in some at-home practice.

SECONDARY (6-II) WITH JASMINE STANCIU

Some key components of the IB MYP program are the learner profile attributes. Each month we focus on one attribute, highlighting key components of that attribute and identifying it within our students. Teachers then nominate students who they have actively seen showing that attribute at school. The month of August was principled and September was inquirer. We were able to gather the middle schoolers outside on





the track for their awards, while high school students did the same thing separately. Check out the photos at left of our awesome principled and inquiring students! They are shining examples for their peers.

October's learner profile attribute was **thinker**. To be a thinker is to use critical and creative thinking skills to analyze and take responsible action on complex problems. We also exercise initiative in making reasoned, ethical decisions. (IBO, 2013).

Students practicing inquiry are expected to complete independent research when investigating real-world problems. During the independent research process a critical step is practicing proper academic honesty in one's writing. With the advances of artificial intelligence, we have seen an increase in academic dishonesty. We encourage you to read through our <u>Academic Integrity Policy</u> with your students and encourage them to always properly give credit for work that is not their own. This is critical to practice now as we are entering Quarter 2 of our first semester.

Progress reports through Toddle are a key component of the secondary community at Sage Middleton. They encapsulate what it means to be an International Baccalaureate student while highlighting the expectations within each class. Please, take the time to read through these and identify areas of strength and potential growth. OUTDOOR EXPEDITIONS WITH MEGAN FUROIS

We are about to wrap up our fall season for expeditions and we had so much fun learning and exploring with our students in outdoor spaces this season!

We were able to take a group of Middleton students out camping over Fall Break to the City of Rocks National Monument. Here they spent 3 days and 2 nights camping under the gorgeous dark sky reserve and rock climbing at the magical Castle Rocks State Park with the support and guidance of our partners at Idaho Mountain Guides. On this trip students learned about the basics of dutch oven cooking, outdoor climbing, and spent time building community and a sense of belonging both in the outdoors as well as at our school! Climbing is a unique activity that is individualistic but also requires a team of support on the belay. It provides a really incredible opportunity for our students to build trust with each other and inspire confidence in



one's self through conquering fear and personal achievement. It was great to see our students build and strengthen relationships through these activities and become more and more confident on the rock. Watch your email for more rock climbing opportunities in the Spring!



The morning was spent hiking Charcoal Gulch Trail where we learned the 7 principles of Leave No Trace and learned how to identify trees using clues from bark, needles/leaves, and cones. The afternoon was filled with a picnic in the park and a scavenger hunt around the historic town of Idaho City. Students

learned all about the historyof the town through the scavenger hunt and practiced navigational skills reading maps to find their clues. LOTS of fun!


SAGE PTO
