


Yearbook orders: There are two different yearbooks and two different websites where you can order online based on grade level.

Welcome, March! Unlike other area schools, March is a full month for us, with our spring break falling the week of April 8th. We look forward to diving in and building on this consistency with our students!


IB Profile Trait: Knowledgeable

MIDDLE SCHOOL WITH ZACH PARKER

All,

We are deep into the school year with much going on and yet time always flies fast. The end of Quarter 3 is on March 20th. During the week after, on **Thursday, March 27th and Friday, March 28th, we will hold Parent Teacher Conferences** in a similar format to the Fall Conferences. The format is open



house for all classes except Language & Literature (English) and Math. These two classes will be by appointment only. Beginning in two weeks, you can expect more information on the conferences along with the links to sign up for those meetings in my weekly update.

It is always important to note around the end of quarters and semesters that students who are failing classes put themselves in a precarious situation of potentially losing too many credits to advance to the next grade. It is also important to note that as a middle school staff, we provide many opportunities for students to reassess failed summatives (tests) as well as time when students can meet with teachers. Furthermore, I like to point out that students have Friday's to complete their homework or any missing assignments.

In general, I attempt to share in each newsletter recommendations regarding our youth and technology. Recently, Emily Cherkin, author of Screen Time Solutions, was in town offering advice for 'tech-intentional parenting'. <u>HERE</u> you can see the big takeaways from her presentation.

On a fun note, Middle School students have been challenged to participate in March Music Madness featuring 32 Classic Rock Bands from the 60s through the early 80s. Throughout the week in Advisory, students will listen to one song from each band and then vote on their favorite song. Students then can complete a bracket for the week and if their pick is the winning band, they earn points for their grade towards the ongoing class competition.


To that end, I encourage you to take time and listen to the music with your students and even vote. Music and connecting over music can be a great support for one's **Mental Health, which is the March focus of Sources of Strength**. While at the dinner table or on a car ride try this prompt for a: "When you feel upset or stressed, what helps you feel better?" It's also beneficial to share your coping mechanisms.

Recently 8th-grade students participated in <u>Snow School at Bogus Basin</u> to learn about snow science and winter ecology. They snowshoed 3 miles of groomed trails, crawled into a snow cave to learn how the structure will keep you comfortable in the elements, and dug snow pits to measure depth and temperature. They learned it's nearly 20 degrees warmer at the bottom of the pit, helping to keep burrowing critters warm throughout the winter. Students also learned how to measure the Snow Water Equivalent (SWE) to determine how much water will be available to the Treasure Valley during spring and summer snowmelt, because of course we rely on that snowpack for irrigation and recreation throughout the rest of the year.

10th Grade Field Trip: Author Talk at Capital High School

On February 27, Sage 10th-grade students, along with high school students from all over the Treasure Valley, attended a lecture by award-winning author of *The Firekeeper's Daughter*, Angeline Boulley at Capital High School. The lecture began with a beautiful welcome from a teacher, artist, musician and his family from the Duck Valley Reservation in Idaho and Nevada. He and his family performed a welcome song he had composed and he talked about the symbolism in his artwork. Angeline Boulley spent most of her lecture answering student-generated questions about her writing process, the artwork on her book covers, and the significance of her Indigenous culture in her work.

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This inspiring presentation tied into the work 10th-grade students did at the beginning of the year in Language and Literature as they read essays from *Braiding Sweetgrass* by Robin Wall Kimmerer and wrote personal narratives about the significance of place for them. (We even had two brave students make it to the stage to meet the author and get



her to sign their book!) As always, students were engaged and respectful and made an excellent impression of Sage out in "the real world" as they referred to Capital High!


