FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, EMILY DOWNEY

Dear families and staff of Sage International Schools,

We've started the year off strong and are now fully engaged in the work of teaching and learning. Last month, I outlined our academic goals: equipping students with strong pre-algebra and algebra skills,

helping them grow as writers at every stage, and ensuring our youngest learners develop the foundational reading skills that open the door to all learning. These remain our top priorities. This month, I want to pause and shine a light on something at the heart of all academic success and that reaches far beyond the classroom - **reading**.

Reading is more than simply learning to read words on a page; it is an essential part of a child's overall academic success and development. Students who are strong readers by the end of third grade are more likely to thrive later in life. Yes, academically, but also physically, mentally, and emotionally.

Parents play a vital role in this shared effort. I had the joy of growing up in a family of readers and clearly remember my mother reading to me, hours exploring the library together, and reading alongside my father during quiet evenings as a teenager. When our first son was in kindergarten, his teacher gathered parents together and advised us to relentlessly read with our children every single night. We took this to heart, and I can honestly say it was one of the best pieces of advice I've ever received. It helped develop excellent and joyful readers and gave my husband and me a powerful way to stay connected to our children as they grew. I truly believe it profoundly impacted my children's learning and our bond with them, and I want to share it with you.

For our youngest children, the key is consistency: reading aloud every day, even for just a few minutes. These moments build vocabulary, strengthen decoding skills, and create joyful experiences with books. Learn more <u>here</u>.

For middle schoolers, we know children are starting to form their own opinions at this age. We often choose a book with our children and read it together, chatting about it at dinner or in the car. Those conversations, sometimes about the plot, other times about bigger questions like, "Do you agree with this character's choice?" or "What do you think the author is trying to say?" gave us a window into their growing independence and developing opinions. We found these moments were less about analyzing the book and more about keeping communication open, strengthening their critical thinking, and letting them know we valued what they had to say. For high school students, the challenge is to go deeper. Encourage them to read both classics and contemporary works, and whenever possible, read alongside them. Sharing a book with our teenagers gave us a common language, rich conversations and a shared experience that kept us in touch with their world. Learn more here.

And, don't underestimate the power of reading aloud, even with older kids. Classics like The Hobbit, The Secret Garden, Moby Dick, and Robinson Crusoe, as well as more contemporary novels like The Book Thief and Life of Pi are not only rich in language but also in wisdom. Reading aloud nourishes the soul, builds family bonds, and teaches lessons about courage, kindness, and resilience. Children (yes, even teens!) often delight in being read to.

I encourage you to make reading a regular and enjoyable part of your family routine. I promise it will pay off in spades, developing passionate, joyful readers and creating a pathway to bond with your children throughout their life. My 88-year-old mother is experiencing dementia and cannot read anymore. However, she remains vibrant and curious, so enjoys listening to audiobooks. She still regularly inquires: "Emily, tell me about what you are reading right now." Right now I am reading *I was Anastasia*. What is your family reading?

PRIMARY YEARS PROGRAMME (K-5) WITH KATE HUNTER

We have really been enjoying the cooler weather the last few weeks and are looking forward to all the fun fall things in October!

Assessment Update

We are wrapping up our fall assessments, which help us gather a multifaceted view of students' current abilities and their next steps in learning. After the fall break, we will send home individualized packets for your review.

Classroom Spotlight – 5th Grade

5th graders are currently engaged in their *Where We Are in Place and Time* IB unit, which is guided by the central idea that "Perspectives have influenced citizens throughout history to take action". This unit provides an opportunity for students to explore the formation of the early US government, and they grapple with both primary source documents (such as the Declaration of Independence) and historical fiction (reading the novel *Chains*). We love that the IB Programme pushes us to grapple with big ideas and events from multiple (and often divergent) perspectives!

All-PYP Spotlight - Vertical, Non-Permanent Spaces

Though it's a mouthful to say, vertical, non-permanent spaces are a hallmark of our inquiry and thinking work in the PYP, particularly in Math.

Our PYP staff dove into Peter Lildejahl's work around <u>Building Thinking Classrooms</u> several years ago as part of our professional development and, as a result, you'll find flexible

vertical workspaces – like whiteboards – across every room in the building. Lildejahl found that, among other practices, using vertical, non-permanent spaces that are set up for collaborative problem-solving keeps students thinking more and longer (just what we want!). Pictured here are some 5th graders solving problems using VNPSs to work through complex math tasks.





Opportunity for 4th graders and their families

We are excited to share with you th <u>Every Kid Outdoors</u> program. Through a collaboration of multiple federal agencies (ex, US Forest Service and The National Park Service), 4th graders can download and print a pass that provides them and their families with free access to ALL national parks, waterways, and lands. Passes are valid for a full calendar year and provide significant savings if national parks or monuments are on your travel itinerary. The program also notes that virtually all Americans are within two hours or less of a nationally-managed landmark, so these passes are great for adventures close to home as well.

MIDDLE SCHOOL (6-8) WITH ZACH PARKER

Recently our middle school students completed their annual MAP assessments, which measure their Math and Reading Comprehension skills. MAP assessments are a nationally normed test that thousands of students across the country take. This year we eliminated the

Language portion of the assessment and are opting to not take the winter assessment, thereby reducing our overall number of week-long tests from 4 to 3 (MAP in the fall and spring, and the state-required ISATs, also in the spring). Students should have received copies of their MAP Scores from teachers. If not, please ask your kiddo about this.

We know there is a lot of pressure on middle school students, and we at Sage are always lookingn out for not only their academic, but their social and emotional wellbeing. This is where **Sources of Strengths (SoS)** comes in. SoS is a research-based suicide prevention organization comprised of students across the middle school and led by Mrs. Gatfield, our 8th-grade Language & Literature teacher. SoS regularly presents 'campaigns' for our students that help them identify a variety of healthy aspects students can lean into when challenges confront them. A few such healthy aspects are: positive friends, physical activities, generosity, and mentorships. The idea is that the more tools one has to use, the more likely one is able to make it through hardships.

Just like SoS, the more tools we as Sage staff use, the better equipped we are to help our students and community succeed. We are collaborating with Boise State University, who is working with schools across the Treasure Valley to conduct an anonymous mental health survey that seeks to understand the pressures students face. The overall results of the survey findings will be shared with the school and families to help us better respond to the hardships our students are facing.



Parents must 'opt-in' and give consent in order for their student(s) to participate. Sage must have at least 60% of students signed up in order to administer it. I highly recommend and kindly ask you to sign your student up so we can continue to pull back the layers and clearly see the needs of our students. Thank you in advance for signing up. 
Camp Sawtooth with our 8th Grade class was such a great experience, building community in preparation for a great year. Thank you for sharing your students with us on this annual trip!





HIGH SCHOOL (9-12) WITH BRANDY BURKETT




This is our third year partnering with this local non-profit organization. One of the cofounders recently presented the opportunity to students and I'd like to share it with you:
